Journey into the Profession

The suburb where I went to high school was in a post-WWII planned town, Park Forest. The original story of Park Forest, the community's racial desegregation in the 1950s, and finally its redevelopment and revitalization efforts in the 90s piqued my interest in urban planning and public policy.
